#### 1/4/12

moribund [MÔR -b nd] adjective Dying; declining.

**Ex.** The scientists looked helplessly at the *moribund* whale that was stranded on the beach, but they were unable to return it to the water.

### 1/5/12

motley [M T 1 ] adjective Of many different or clashing elements.

**Ex.** The *motley* outfit of the circus clown was not as remarkable as the bright red color of his nose and hair.

# 1/6/12

**nascent** [N S nt] adjective Coming into existence; emerging.

**Ex.** Howard Hughes was a pioneer in the *nascent* aviation industry during the 1930's.

#### 1/9/12

**negligible** [N\_G l\_-j\_-b\_l] *adjective* Able to be neglected or disregarded; so small or insignificant as to be unimportant.

**Ex.** The *negligible* amount of rainfall last month did nothing to help relieve the drought.

#### 1/10/12

**nominal** [N\_M \_-n\_l] *adjective* In name only; relatively very small.

**Ex.** Although the executive was the *nominal* head of the business, his son was the one who really ran the company.

## 1/11/12

**noxious** [N K sh s] *adjective* Harmful to health or morals; injurious or unwholesome.

**Ex.** The *noxious* fumes from the kerosene heater filled the room.

#### 1/12/12

**obdurate** [\_B dyoo-r\_t] *adjective* Hardhearted; stubborn, obstinate.

**Ex.** His *obdurate* refusal to listen to my side of the story was not fair.

## 1/13/12

**obeisance** [\_-B\_ s\_ns *or* \_-B\_ s\_ns] *noun* A gesture of respect, as a bow; homage; deference.

**Ex.** In *obeisance* to the local customs, female reporters in Afghanistan wear scarves over their heads.
